Promoting Women's Economic Empowerment in a holistic, cross organizational way

How can we support GIZ projects in establishing a holistic approach to foster gender equality within their projects, which goes beyond a reflection on counting participants, but rather towards the benefits to women in our partner countries?

How can we give a voice to people, inspire others, and learn from each other about what needs to be done to strengthen women's economic empowerment?

How can we keep our GIZ colleagues both at HQ and in our projects abroad informed about relevant trends, facts and figures as well as opportunities around women's economic empowerment?

Finding answers to these questions is a challenge for those in GIZ particularly interested in women's economic empowerment since many different units work on the topic without a central project being responsible for the topic. Therefore, the GIZ Women's Economic Empowerment (WEE) Team in GloBe was established in March 2020 by three sectoral projects (SP): The SP "Promoting Gender Equality" (SV Gender), the SP "Sustainable Economic Development" (SV NaWi) and the SP "Financial systems development, sustainable finance and investments" (SV FSE).

The Team consists of motivated and passionate cross-sectoral gender-focal points, who aim at providing meaningful and practical advice to GIZ colleagues in fostering women's economic empowerment in GIZ project operations. The GIZ WEE Team also promotes exchange between the internal and external structure of GIZ to connect people interested in engaging on women's economic empowerment. This also means engaging with other organizations and external experts to learn and get inspired by their experiences. By joining hands, the WEE Team is also in the position to provide advice to BMZ on WEE related issues more efficiently.

To do all that in service of promoting WEE, the Team has established a series of complementary formats. The results of all formats, which are described below, are shared on the IDA community (<u>Gender Network</u>). This allows the Team to sustainably disseminate and pass on the generated knowledge and insights.¹

WEE Helpdesk

A collaborative Problem Solving for Women's Economic Empowerment Challenges

Organized as a collegial brainstorming session, the WEE Helpdesk provides a successful framework to pool gender-related knowledge from across the organization. By offering this innovative modality, the GIZ WEE Team brings together various perspectives in the search for meaningful and practical advice to foster women's economic empowerment in GIZ's project operations.

"Within a very short amount of time, we received solution-oriented inputs from real practitioners. No need to search for gender experts from multiple disciplines; no need to request and arrange individual calls with different experts; with one short presentation, we entered an arranged setting to capture all inspirations by a pool of experts."

To use the Helpdesk, GIZ colleagues are invited to pitch the specific WEE challenges they are facing to the Helpdesk participants. This pitch is followed by a common brainstorming session. The participants range from GIZ colleagues from the internal and external structure to additional invited external experts (e.g. academia, KfW and other development practitioners), offering their specific advice tailored to the challenge.

A pitch can cover many different aspects and stages of an ongoing or planned project. Since the start of the Helpdesk in March 2020, seven projects have pitched their challenges:

"Ways to increase women's economic participation" Employment-oriented MSME Promotion Project in Jordan
"Increasing access to financial services for women" ProEcon – Improving Framework Conditions in the Private and Financial Sector (Mozambique)
"Supporting Central Bank of Egypt in addressing the gender gap in financial inclusion" Promotion of Access to financial services for SMEs in Egypt (PAFSME)
"Promotion of women in the transport and logistic sector" Professional Driver Training Uganda project (PDTU)
"Women in informal cross-border food trade" Global project Agricultural Policy and Innovation Fund (FABI) / SP Agriculture
"Women's access to remittances and other financial services through digital solutions" Digittances project in Jordan
"How can DFIs be supported in promoting gender sensitive financing" Investment Climate Reform (ICR) Facility - Africa, Caribbean and Pacific countries

The Ideas developed during the brainstorming session are documented, circulated to all participants, and uploaded onto the IDA community. In many cases, bilateral follow-ups – often between colleagues working in different departments – take place. This generates innovative solutions to dealing with the presented gender challenge. The WEE team is constantly evolving and incorporating feedback to achieve the most effective modus operandi. A Helpdesk set up for specific regions (e.g. Africa, via the sector network NEDA) is currently being evaluated.

WEE Podcast

Listening to stories on WEE that have the power to inspire others

In the WEE Podcast series, the Team wants to give a voice to people with a wealth of experience. People who can share their impressions and shed light on challenges as well as opportunities women and female entrepreneurs are facing in their day-to-day work. The interview partners are providing interesting food for thought and fresh ideas on what needs to be done to strengthen women's economic empowerment. And most importantly: the podcast allows listening to those stories that have inspired us and have the power to inspire others.

Women's Financial Inclusion Toolkit

A practitioner's guide to address barriers to women's financial inclusion

Since financial inclusion reduces poverty and improves peoples' resilience, family well-being, and economic growth, the new <u>Women's Financial Inclusion (WFI) Toolkit - Paving the way for women's economic empowerment (giz.de)</u> – produced jointly by the Competence Centre Financial Systems Development and the Sector Project FSD – significantly contributes to women's economic empowerment and gender equality. As the hindrances to women's financial inclusion are multidimensional and often interlinked, the WEE Team through its wide-ranging network and experience around gender can help promote the application of the Toolkit in a variety of areas, for example, to address restrictive social norms.

In addition to that, the Sector Project "Sustainable Economic Development" (SV NaWi) has developed an interactive resource designed to equip GIZ colleagues with the knowledge and strategies required to meet the needs of women entrepreneurs.

Handbook on Accelerating Women Entrepreneurs

This Handbook developed by SV NaWi in collaboration with GIZ colleagues around the world equips practitioners with key strategies to apply a gender-lens to each component of an Accelerator program. It demonstrates the business case for accelerating women entrepreneurs and provides insights from GIZ-supported Accelerator programs that have applied a gender lens. The Handbook will be launched in January 2022.

A comprehensive overview of GIZ projects working on WEE

There are many projects in GIZ that work on WEE, but so far there has been no central overview of WEE projects. As a first step, the SV NaWi started the collection of WEE projects in collaboration with other members of the WEE Team by designing a survey. The current results have been collected in a sheet and contain information on the projects and their WEE related activities. In the future, the list is planned to be expanded on a running basis and will be shared openly and collaboratively within GIZ. This will provide the GIZ staff with a larger picture of GIZ's current contribution to promote WEE and will help to improve the current work on WEE.

Outlook

The experiences made by the GloBe WEE Team show the continuous need for providing meaningful advice within GIZ project operations. This implies fostering the exchange between the internal and external structure, learning from each other, and keeping each other informed on how to best promote WEE. These needs are reflected by the strong interest in the complementary formats the WEE team provides, and the positive feedback received. Going forward, the WEE Team will continue enhancing the established formats and develop and implement new innovative ideas.
